II. PERIOD

This period was only of a very short duration, i.e. between the middle of 1886 and the middle of 1888. One could say that this was more or less a trial period. A new type of cancel was cut in steel where the doublicity of the formerly seperated 2 cancels was eliminated, uniting the dated cancel with a duplex in form of concentrating circles in a one and only stamper. The duplex was placed at 5 mm to the right of the dated cancel. The whole device was most probably also copied from U.S. cancels of the same period.

There exist 2 different types of such cancels. Between two separated rings (in some cases the outer line is doubled with another very thin line) the name of the town is placed in the upper half of the circle and the word Nicaragua in the lower half. In one kind of the cancels only the month (in abreviated form) with the date underneeth are indicated, in the other kind we find also the year in a third row. (see fig. 1 + 2)



The word CORREOS was ommitted and in some cancels a stop can be found after the name of the town and after Nicaragua. The cancels were mostly applied in black, but colors as grey-blue, magenta or violet exist.

Most of these cancels had a diameter of 30 mm (without the duplex), with the exception of SAN JUAN DEL NORTE and SAN JUAN DEL SUR with a diameter of 35 mm each. (fig. 2a and 2b)




The application of such stampers, including the duplex about 51 mm large, was certainly not very easy and it is supposed that foir this reason these stampe4rs were cut into two halfs and used seperately. Specially on the early postcards with the national emblem and the value printed in full words, such a duplex cancel did not make any sense. Many of the early postcards (Ascher N° 1 - 6) are therefore found with the circular cancel only, whereas the "duplex" can more easely be found on stamps of the 1882 (U.P.U.) issue.

Covers with cancels of this period are rather scarce!






